With a cruising speed of 135 knots, we are able to provide an essential emergency service, reaching patients within 25 minutes, often in remote locations. The objective of the Charity is the relief of sickness and injury and protection of human life principally by the provision of an air ambulance mainly within the area served by East of England ambulance service NHS Trust. With a highly skilled doctor, critical care paramedic and specialist medical equipment on board each flight, we are effectively able to Fly the expertise of the accident and emergency department to the scene. This ensures our patients receive the best possible emergency medical care, which can make the difference between long-term injury and recovery, life and death. #### C. Your Application

a) Brief description of project or scheme for which grant is intended

We are hoping to deliver CPR training sessions to Key Stage 2 pupils in a local school. There is great evidence that bystander CPR administered within the first ten minutes of a patient losing consciousness can make a positive difference and we believe in equipping local children with this vital life skill. Jack-Charlie was just six years old when his heart stopped suddenly while he was eating his breakfast. Mum Tracey performed CPR until EAAA arrived and were able to restart his heart with a defibrillator. He was then airlifted to Addenbrooke's for further care. After 3 days on life support he was transferred to Great Ormond Street Hospital where he was fitted with an implantable defibrillator which would restart his heart if it were to happen again. The outcome could have been very different had it not been for the CPR he received from his mother.

b) Who will benefit from the proposed project or scheme and how many of these are Cam residents?

Key Stage 2 pupils in a school local to Waterbeach. Potentially 100% of these would be Cam residents dependent on the catchment area of the school. The extended benefit of a greater awareness of CPR in the community could of course be much wider.

### **Richard Fryer**

On 23 January 2012, 34 year old Richard Fryer from Burwell near Cambridge was driving his seven year old son, Freddy, to school when his car collided with a lorry between Bottisham and Newmarket.

Freddy broke his leg but Richard was far more seriously hurt, receiving life-threatening head and chest injuries. Anglia Two's crew was quickly on scene, providing initial care before escorting him to the Major Trauma Centre at Addenbrooke's Hospital. He was in a coma for several weeks but has gone on to amaze doctors by making an excellent recovery.

He and his family have since become passionate supporters of the EAAA. Freddy wrote a book about his experiences, raising nearly £3,000. Members of a fitness class run by Richard's wife Charlie took part in a sponsored 10k run at Wimpole Hall in May, raising almost £2,000 while Richard organised a family fun day at a local pub, raising over £4,000.

2012 was a roller coaster but we're determined to take as many positives as we can from what could have been a tragic situation. Raising this money is just a start and a small thank you from us.
